

For the week of Sixteenth Sunday after Pentecost September 17th through September 23rd, 2023

Notes for the Week — Forgiveness without End, Matthew 18:21-35

During Midweek Table Talk, we talked about the two greatest doctrines of the Bible: Law and Gospel. It is extremely important to rightly distinguish these two for properly understanding Jesus and what He does for us. The Law is all God commands us to do or not do. The Law also includes its consequences. It promises life to all who keep it but deals death to all who transgress. Death includes the effect of sin on our lives. Living in a fallen world and all that brings is part of the Law. The Gospel, on the other hand, is what God does on our behalf. It promises life to all who believe that God has done it and will do it for us.

But here's the thing: the Gospel only comes through fulfilling the Law. That is why Christ came to stand in our place. We couldn't meet the Law's demands, so Christ was born in our flesh under the Law. He actively fulfilled the Law for us by living perfectly without sin. It was only because of this He could stand for us on the cross where He passively fulfilled the Law by facing the wrath of God against our sin. The Gospel for us meant the Law for Him. On account of His life and death, we were set free from the Law.

But does that mean we are now free to do as we please? Free to satisfy our flesh? Never! We were set free from the Law by love in order to be love. Having been saved by Christ we do not discard the Law but turn to it to see what God would have us do, but instead of doing its good works for my own benefit I know I have all I need in Christ. Therefore, I seek to do good works for the sake of my neighbor out of love. We "take up the Law" to "be the Gospel" for someone else.

Our good works don't merit them forgiveness, but we do reflect Christ to them through our good works. How is this related to our Gospel text today? Consider Peter. He believes he is being very generous, "Hey, Jesus, check out my righteousness! I'll forgive someone seven times!" No, Peter. You still don't get it. If the Father only forgave you seven times, you would still be condemned. If the Father had any limit on His forgives, no matter how 'generous,' you would be lost forever. Not only do you sin, but you have sin clinging to your very flesh. Only death and resurrection can kill your sin and make you holy. And that death is what I am going to undertake.

We, in response to God's limitless love and forgiveness for us turn and pour out that love and forgiveness upon others. Not seven times, Peter, but so many times you give up counting and just keep forgiving. Is it hard? Absolutely. Do we at times feel like it will kill us. Yes. But that's the point. Jesus literally offered up His life that we may be forgiven, and so we seek to be faithful to His love and forgiveness by offering our own lives as instruments of His forgiveness. We "take up the Law" to "be the Gospel" by showing others the depth of God's love for them in Jesus Christ our Lord, even if it kills us. Amen.

Looking Forward to "The Seventeenth Sunday after Pentecost"

<u>September 24, 2023</u>

Readings: Isaiah 55:6-9 | Philippians 1:12-14, 19-30 | Matthew 20:1-16

Those who are sent as "laborers for his vineyard" (Matt. 20:1) depict the wide diversity of vocations to which the disciples of Christ Jesus are called. Whatever our particular stations in life may be, we are called to live and serve by faith in His promises. Our labors do not merit anything before Him, for He is already generous to one and all without partiality. In mercy, He has chosen to bear "the burden of the day and the scorching heat" on our behalf, to make us equal to Himself and to give us what belongs to Him, that is, the kingdom of heaven (Matt. 20:12-15). This way of the Lord is foolishness to the world and foreign to our thoughts, but He draws near, so that "he may be found" (Is. 55:6), "have compassion" and "abundantly pardon" (Is. 55:7). So it is that we are found in Christ Jesus, and He is honored in our bodies, "whether by life or by death" (Phil. 1:20), by "fruitful labor" (Phil. 1:22) or by suffering. It is by faith in His forgiveness that our works are "worthy of the gospel" (Phil. 1:27).
