Notes for the Week — By What Authority, Matthew 21:23–27

I recently engaged someone who accused me of earning a living by taking you all for fools. He argued that Christianity is unreasonable and every critically thinking person could see that. I invited him to demonstrate his critical thinking prowess by making me a fool right there on the spot. He began by asserting the extreme improbability of many events in the Bible. I redirected him, telling him that if you believe in an almighty God who intervenes in creation for the sake of His people, then although the events are highly improbable of themselves (which itself doesn't disprove they happened), it is actually extremely unreasonable to disbelieve that an Almighty God did as He said He did. Therefore, his argument should be about how believing in God is unreasonable. Eventually he took my advice, and asserted that either God is Almighty or good, but He cannot be both. I asked him to demonstrate how his assertion is true, and he started telling me about how a good, almighty God couldn't allow evil to exist. I responded by asking him where he got his notion of "good" and "evil."

The elders and chief priests wanted to know by whose authority Jesus taught. Jesus asked them, "Where did the baptism of John come from?" The chief priests and elders knew they were trapped. They either had to acknowledge that John was not a prophet, or justify why they didn't listen to his word about Jesus. They didn't want to do either, so they despised Jesus for it. People don't want to acknowledge God, but they want to use His own words to accuse Him, just like the person did who told me that God cannot be good while allowing evil to exist. Which is it, is God the authority or not? If He is the authority, then why don't you believe Him? If He is not the authority, then you have no standard to accuse Him by. Yet, people don't like when we defend the truth and point to God's authority. It leads to mocking and plotting and even death.

But here's the good news. Rage as they will, even the devil, for they do not have the authority. Only God does. And the Father is the one who sent Christ for us to believe in, to die and rise again. And on account of Christ, there is nothing our opponents can do to us. They have no authority. So even if they should kill us, God will only raise us again. Let them rage, for the gates of hell cannot overcome Jesus Christ our Lord. And He will come again in His authority, and every knee will bow and every tongue will confess and we will be vindicated as we are raised to eternal life. Amen.

Looking Forward to "The Nineteenth Sunday after Pentecost"

October 8, 2023

Readings: Isaiah 5:1-7 | Philippians 3:4b-14 | Matthew 21:33-46

"The vineyard of the LORD of hosts is the house of Israel" (Is. 5:7), which He planted "on a very fertile hill" (Is. 5:1). He did everything for His vineyard, not only clearing it of stones and planting it with "choice vines," but also building the "watchtower" of His prophets and hewing out the "wine vat" of His priesthood in its midst (Is. 5:2). But when "he looked for it to yield grapes," there were only "wild grapes" of bloodshed and unrighteousness (Is. 5:2, 7). The Lord Jesus likewise described the unfaithfulness of those who were called to care for His vineyard (Matt. 21:33–35). But in this He also describes His cross and Passion (Matt. 21:38–39), by which He has redeemed the vineyard for Himself. He is the true Vine, planted by death into the ground, and in His resurrection He brings forth "the fruits in their seasons" (Matt. 21:41). Among those good grapes of the true Vine is the apostle Paul. Once a zealous persecutor of the Church, he "suffered the loss of all things" in order to "gain Christ and be found in him," to "know him and the power of his resurrection" (Phil. 3:8–10)
