Notes for the Week — He has chosen you, 1 Thessalonians 1

This week, we welcome new members into our congregation. What should our thoughts and attitudes be toward these new members? Paul has some wise words for us as he begins his letter to the Thessalonians, "We give thanks to God always for all of you, constantly mentioning you in our prayers, remembering before our God and Father your work of faith and labor of live and steadfastness of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ."

How often do we remember to pray for those younger in the confession than we are? Even more, how often do we provide positive examples for them to imitate in the Lord? It is in the discipling community that the power of the Holy Spirit is made known. The discipling community builds one another up in love and words and works. It is clear to anyone looking on that Christ is among them. The reputation of the Thessalonians was well known far and wide because they were such a type of community.

May we look to both Paul and the Thessalonians as an example to us to follow. May we be a community that loves all those who come to it, building them up in the true confession of faith and performing acts of love for all members, especially those younger in the faith.

Looking Forward to "Reformation Day"

October 29, 2023

Readings: Revelation 14:6-7 | Romans 3:19-28 | John 8:31-36 or Matthew 11:12-19

"Wisdom is justified by her deeds" (Matt. 11:19), and the true wisdom of God, Christ Jesus, the incarnate Son, justifies us by His deeds. He prepares His way by the preaching of repentance, but He has suffered the violence of the Law and voluntarily handed Himself over to violent men, in order that we may eat and drink with Him in His Kingdom and "remain in the house forever" (John 8:35). He is "a friend of tax collectors and sinners" (Matt. 11:18-19), and He has rescued us by His grace from the slavery of sin and death. By the proclamation of His eternal Gospel "to those who dwell on earth, to every nation and tribe and language and people" (Rev. 14:6), "the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law" (Rom. 3:21), "that he might be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus" (Rom. 3:26). And by the hearing of that Gospel of Christ Jesus, "whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith" (Rom. 3:25), "you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free" (John 8:31-32).
