For the week of the Third Sunday in Advent December 17th through December 23rd, 2023

Notes for the Week — Rejoice Always, 1 Thessalonians 5:16-24

The Third Sunday in Advent is the time that we light that special "pink" candle on the Advent Wreath. This Sunday is known as *Gaudete* Sunday, or, the Sunday of Joy.

This is the only Sunday in Advent with an official liturgical theme: the joy that Christ brings. "Joy to the world, the Lord is come! Let earth receive her King!" Now that's an odd phrasing, isn't it. *The Lord is come!* Notice the jubilant shout of the beloved Christmas hymn isn't "The Lord has come," but "the Lord is come!" Of course we prepare ourselves in Advent to receive the Lord in the celebration of His birth on Christmas, but in the "coming" of Advent and Christmas we celebrate more than just a memory. We celebrate the continual coming of our Lord, the King of Heaven and earth. He came to us as an infant, then He grew into the man who would offer Himself on the cross for the sins of the World. Then He ascended back to His heavenly throne.

However, Jesus did not die to make us His own to then just leave us. "I will not leave you as orphans; I will come to you," Jesus says (John 14:18). This coming, too, is more than Jesus' final return. But as John confesses, "I baptize you with water," but Jesus baptizes with the Holy Spirit and with fire. Jesus sends to us the Holy Spirit, and it is through the Holy Spirit that Jesus comes to us here and now. As we gather together, as we receive His Word, as we pray, as we give thanks. And it is that same Spirit that Paul tells us not to quench. Why? Because it is that Spirit who reveals the truth to us through the Word of God.

It is the truth of Jesus given to us by the Spirit that we are able to find our solace, our peace, our strength, our forgiveness, our salvation, our life, even when the world and the devil rage and storm around us. That is because we know that this world is passing away and the devil's time is short. They are coming to an end. However, what the Spirit brings us is eternal. We know that an end is coming for sin and death, and we have that hope and joy living in us. In fact, that eternal existence is so real that it flows back to us here and now. Through faith, we get a foretaste of the feast to come.

That is where our joy comes from. It doesn't come from what we can muster up ourselves, but rather it comes from Jesus whose word and Spirit dwell within us. And the Spirit makes and keeps us holy and blameless and brings us safely to the day when Jesus comes again to put away sin and death once and for all. That is truly a message of joy!

Looking Forward to "Christmas Eve"

December 24, 2023

Readings: Isaiah 7:10-14 | 1 Joh 4:7-16 | Matthew 1:18-25

Though Ahaz would not ask, the Lord gives a sign to the House of David — "the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel" (Is. 7:14). With this promise, He signifies that salvation is by His grace alone. It is no work or achievement of man, but the Lord's own work and His free gift. The promise is fulfilled as the Son of God is conceived and born of the Virgin Mary, and the sign is received in faith by the House of David in the person of Joseph (Matt. 1:20–24). "Incarnate by the Holy Spirit of the Virgin Mary" (Nicene Creed), God is with us (Immanuel) in the flesh of Jesus, Mary's Son. Joseph believes that Word of God and so demonstrates a marvelous example in his immediate and quiet obedience, taking Mary to be his wife and caring for her in faith and love. He loves her because the love of God is manifest in this, that "the Father has sent his Son to be the Savior of the world," to be "the propitiation for our sins" (1 John 4:10–14).
