Notes for the Week — "Blessed Is the Man Who Remains Steadfast Under Trial" James 1:12

Our Gospel lesson begins, "In those days..." With such an opening, it begs the question, "In what days?" And if you notice, we're only nine verses into Mark's Gospel. Mark doesn't begin with an infant narrative. He doesn't have any sheep or wisemen. He doesn't have any stories of Jesus before His public ministry began. Mark simply states, "The beginning of the gospel of Jesu Christ, the Son of God." And off he goes with John in the wilderness heralding the Kingdom and the preparing the way of the Lord through baptism.

It is "in those days" that we first encounter Jesus. He came to be baptized by John, and when He was, the heavens were torn open, the Spirit descended on Him, and a voice from heaven declared Him to be the Son of God. Okay....now what? What was the point of all this? What is the purpose? Mark immediately makes that clear.

"The Spirit immediately drove Him out into the wilderness. And He was in the wilderness forty days, being tempted by Satan." Short, sweet and to the point. Mark adds no details of conversations between Jesus. He doesn't need to. The confrontations between the kingdom of darkness and the Kingdom of Light will soon unfold in Mark's Gospel. That's the main theme of the entire Gospel. What we need at this point, though, is to know that Jesus is the Lord's Anointed, the One upon whom the Spirit descends and the Father reveals. And His coming, the Spirit's anointing, the Father's revelation is all for the purpose of facing down Satan.

Jesus has come to do what we were unable to do. Adam faced Satan in the garden and lost miserably. He didn't even put up a fight. He even offered up his bride to Satan as a sacrificial offering as he sat back and watched everything unfold. Jesus, however, is different. He wasn't going to sit back and watch Satan destroy His Bride through temptation. Instead, He came to place Himself between Satan and His Bride, and to endure temptation in our place. Jesus was going to do what we couldn't do and win us back from the clutches of Satan, sin, death, and hell.

And the same Spirit that drove Jesus out into the wilderness on our behalf, is the same Spirit that brings that victory over Satan to you and me. He gives us Jesus' victory over Satan, sin, death and hell. Though we will live in these bodies of flesh, our spirits are made alive in Him. Therefore, we are given power from the Spirit to struggle against Satan and temptation. Though this striving is empowered by God, it is not from God. He does not tempt us. That is our own sinful flesh with "helpful" suggestions from Satan. But the Lord promises that when we remain steadfast against temptation, we are blessed. That victory is our final victory flowing to us here and now. And it is to that victory we press on. Amen.

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Looking Forward to "The Second Sunday in Lent

<u>February 25, 2024</u>

Readings: Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16 | Romans 8:1-11 | Mark 8:27-38

In His covenant with Abraham, the Lord promised to be with him, to bless him and to make him "the father of a multitude of nations." It is "an everlasting covenant" in Christ Jesus, the seed of Abraham who is blameless before God Almighty. All who believe in this Lord Jesus are the offspring of Abraham and are blessed "throughout their generations" (Gen. 17:1–7), because the Christ has suffered many things. He was rejected and killed, and after three days He rose again (Mark 8:31). To comprehend this theology of the cross, we must set our minds "on the things of God," and not "on the things of man" (Mark 8:33). "God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Rom. 5:8). Therefore, having been "reconciled to God by the death of his Son," much more "shall we be saved by his life" (Rom. 5:10). Baptized into His cross and resurrection, "we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ," and by faith we rejoice in the hope of His glory (Rom. 5:1–2).
